## What is the difference between a Special Commissioner's Sale of real estate (Judicial Sale) and a Non-Judicial Sale?

A Special Commissioner's Sale (Judicial Sale) of real property is handled under the auspices of the Circuit Court. The Court ensures that all parties are properly before the Court before authorizing a sale. The Special Commissioner's Sale is free and clear of all liens on the property including the taxes due. The sale must be confirmed by the Court before a Deed can be issued.

A Non-Judicial Sale is conducted without court oversight and is limited to certain generally non-buildable parcels of real estate. The property is conveyed by a Special Warranty Deed. The terms and conditions of a Non-Judicial tax sale are slightly different from a Special Commissioner's Sale, with all funds required to be paid on the date of sale.
