6.0 (1) The toilet is loose at the floor. Repairs may involve re-setting the toilet on a new wax seal. I recommend a qualified licensed plumber repair or correct as needed.

6.0 (2) Kitchen dishwasher drain should loop higher to properly function/ avoid backflow. Repair to normal function.

6.3 Main water shut off is located in the water heater closet.

The plumbing in the home was inspected and reported on with the above information. While the inspector makes every effort to find all areas of concern, some areas can go unnoticed. Washing machine drain line for example cannot be checked for leaks or the ability to handle the volume during drain cycle. Older homes with galvanized supply lines or cast iron drain lines can be obstructed and barely working during an inspection but then fails under heavy use. If the water is turned off or not used for periods of time (like a vacant home waiting for closing) rust or deposits within the pipes can further clog the piping system. Please be aware that the inspector has your best interest in mind. Any repair items mentioned in this report should be considered before purchase. 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8.3 (1) Subject home's return filter has been configured to be installed in the Plenum beneath the furnace. There is a wide gap on the evaporator side of the filter at time of inspection as the filter does not sit securely in its configured space. Have a qualified contractor evaluate and correct as needed to achieve normal, efficient function and avoid debris from the living space by passing the return filter. Recommend cleaning the coil, motor and fan at the interior unit.

8.3 (2) Have a qualified HVAC contractor evaluate ducts in the attic. Seal gaps and insulate where missing.

8.8 22 degree splits. Pan and line float switches are installed at attic unit.

The heating and cooling system of this home was inspected and reported on with the above information. While the inspector makes every effort to find all areas of concern, some areas can go unnoticed. The inspection is not meant to be technically exhaustive.
